in almost every classroom in Oregon experienced homelessness in 2011–2012.

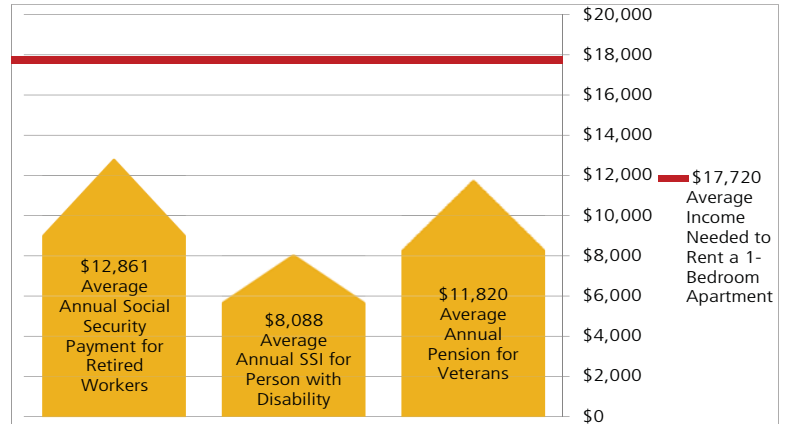

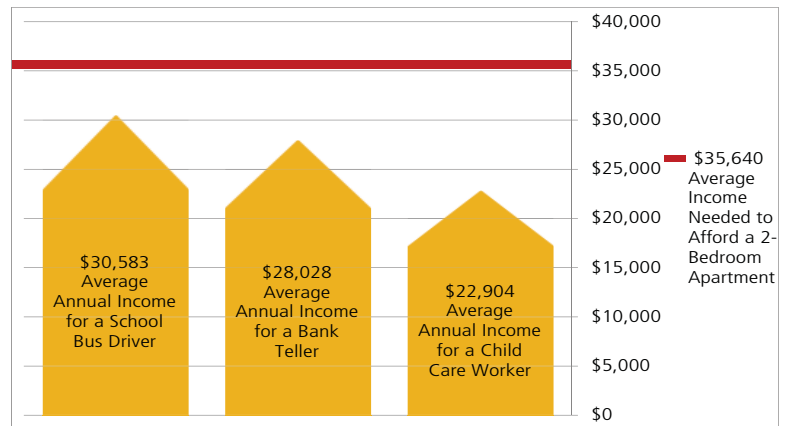

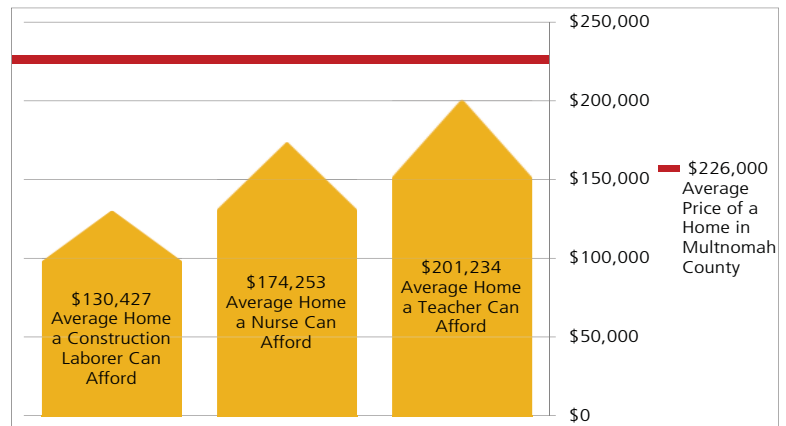
Average Incomes of Multnomah County's Most Vulnerable Citizens
