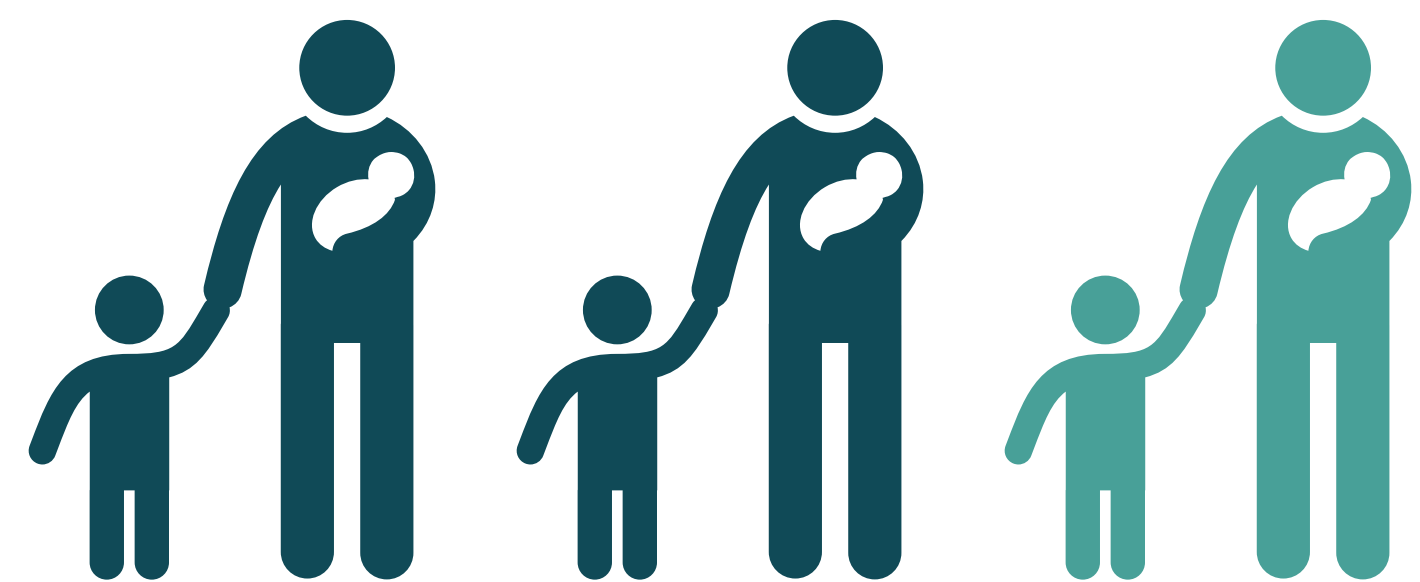

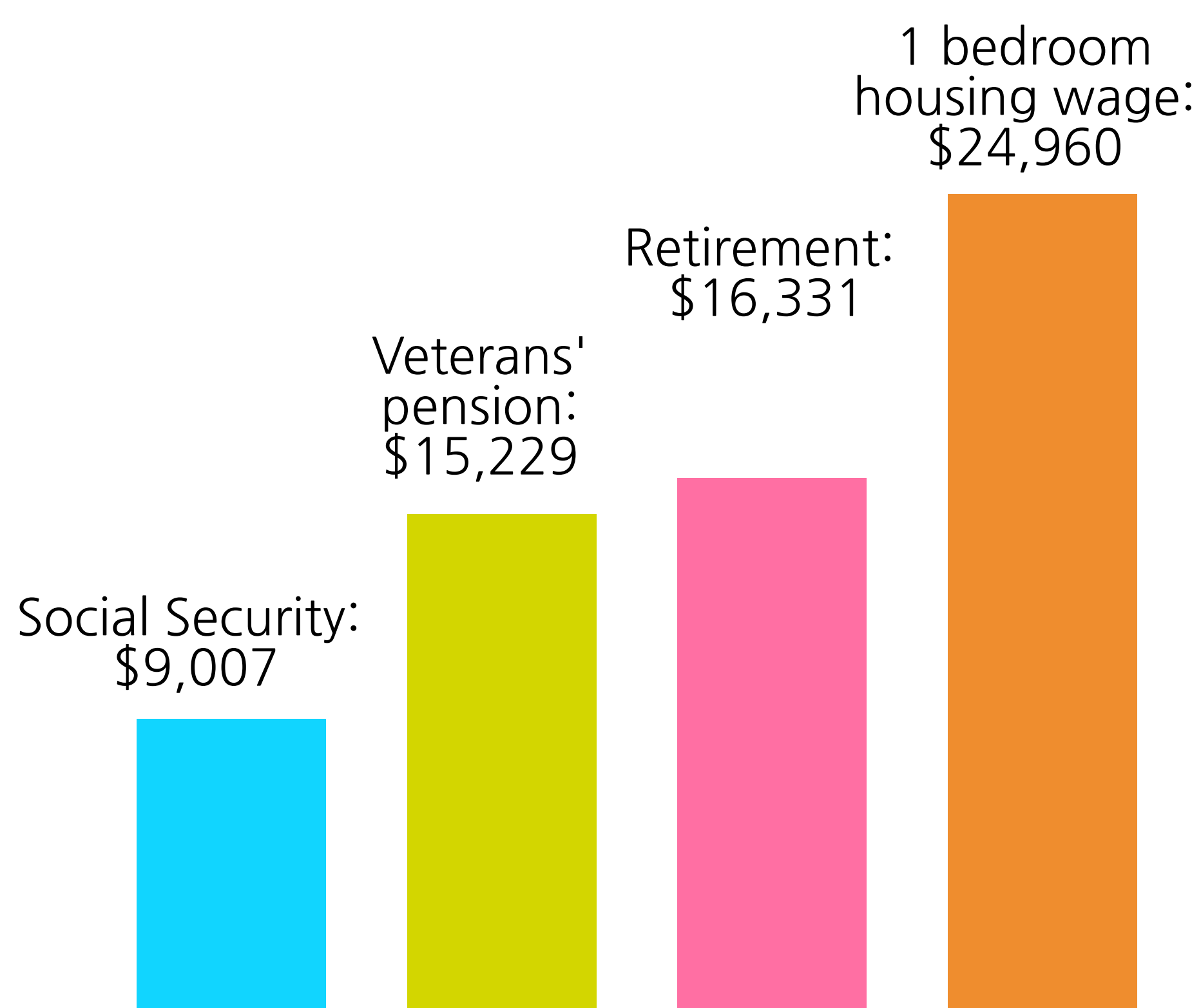

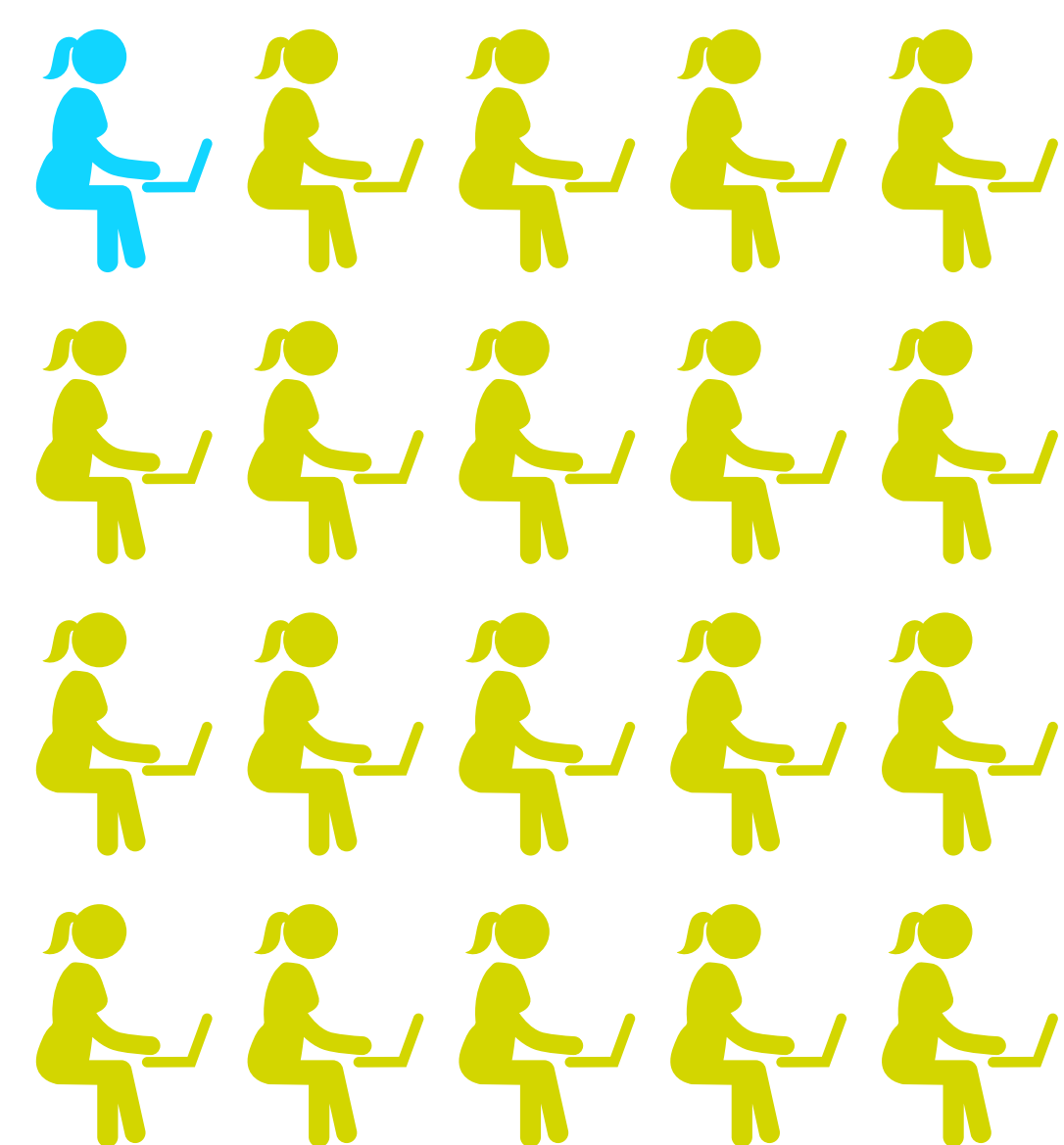
Our neighbors are facing homelessness

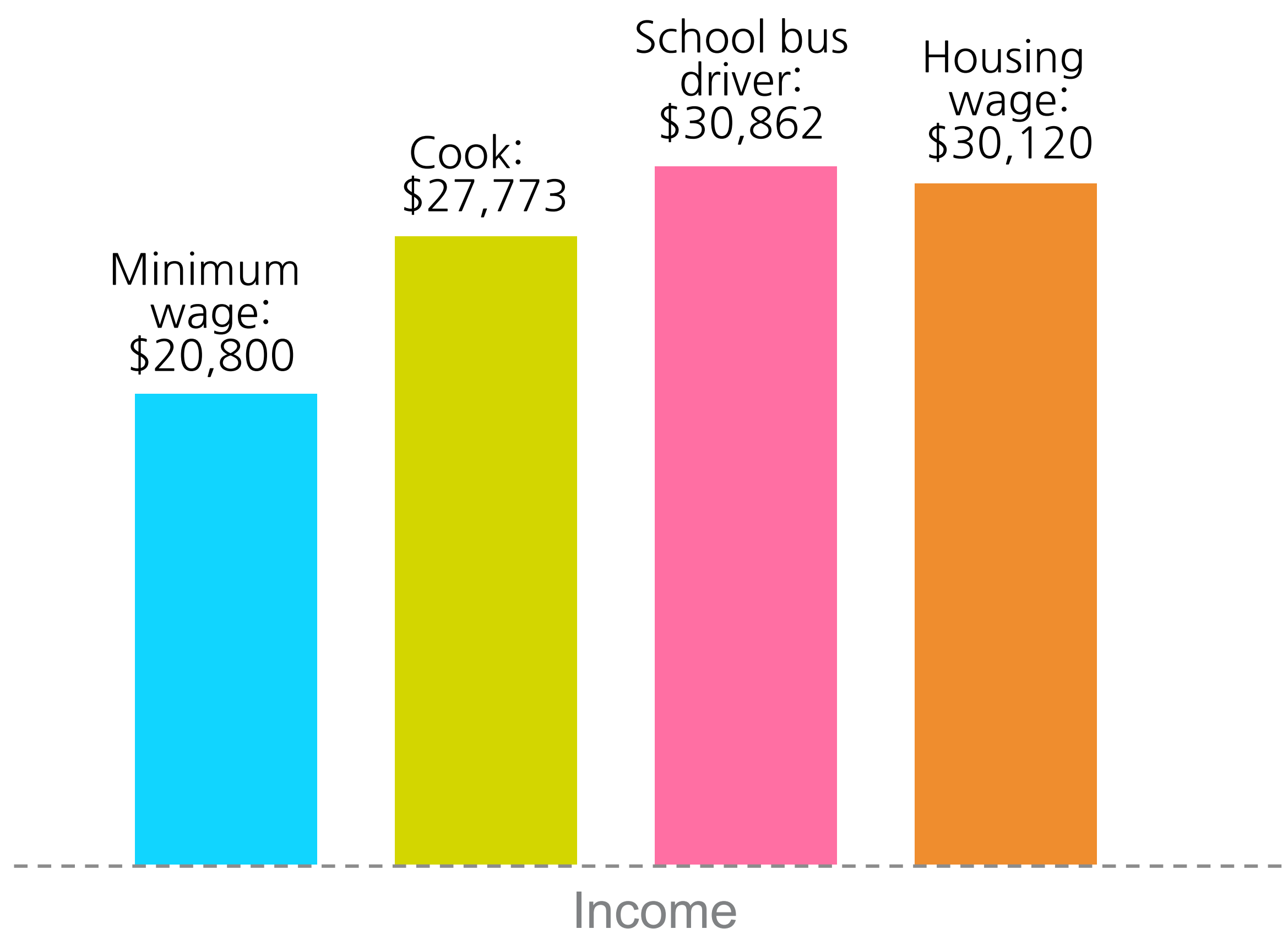


Mean renter wage



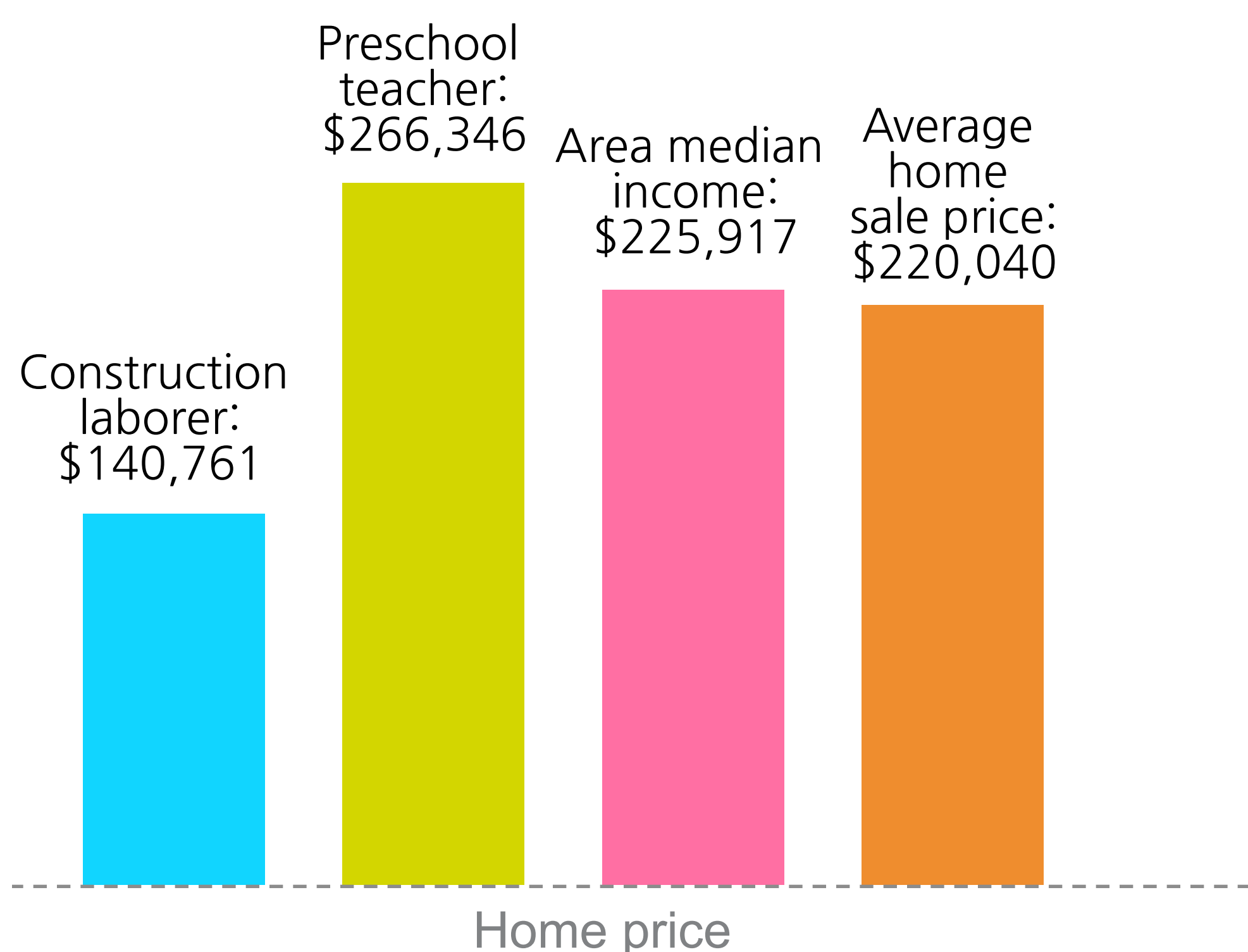
Number of hours per week at minimum wage needed to afford a 2 bedroom apartment
