We have a serious shortage of affordable housing

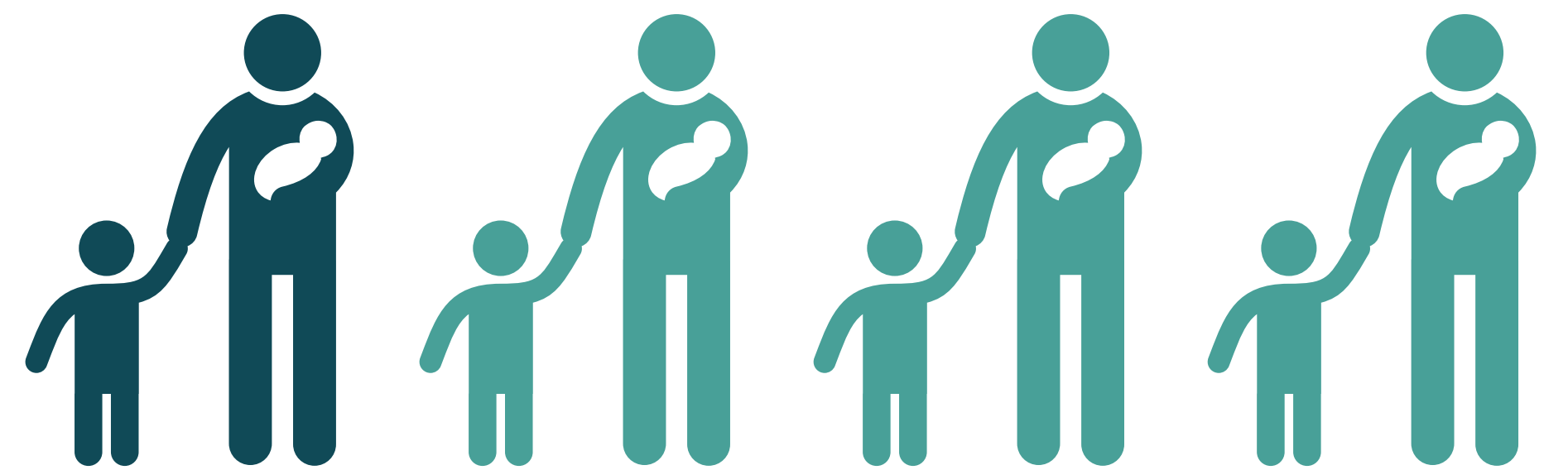
For every 100 families with extremely low incomes, there are 22 affordable units available.

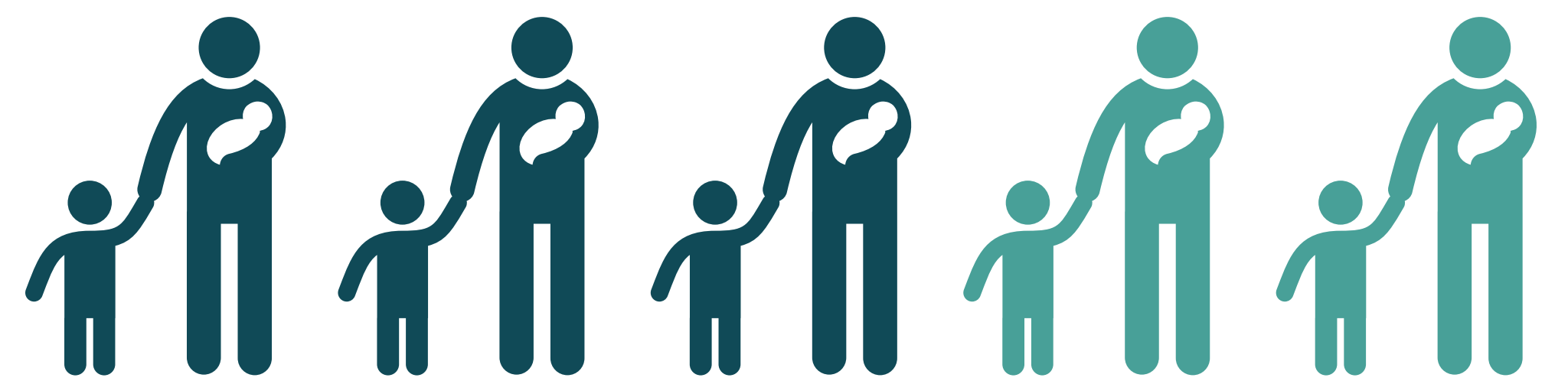

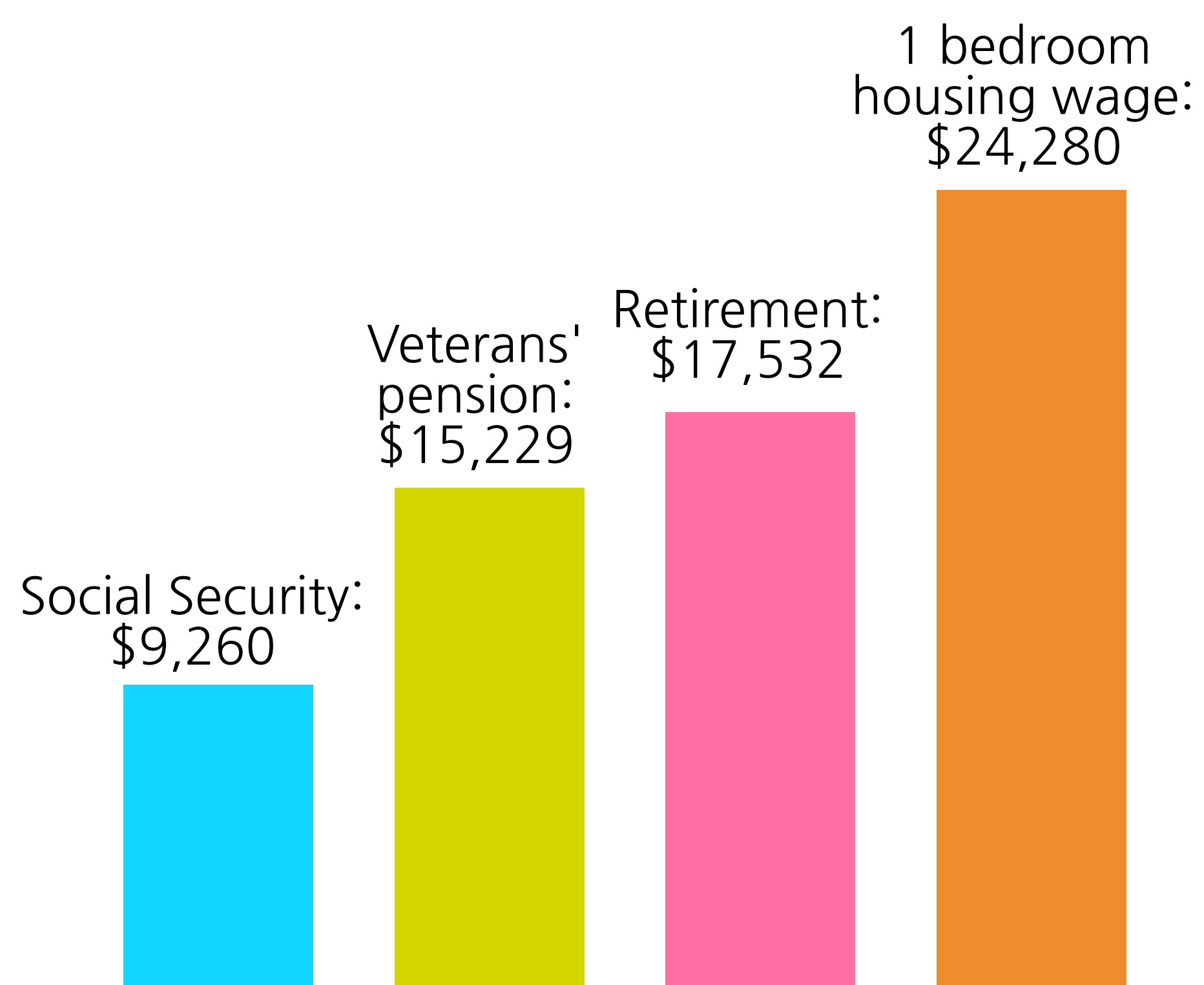

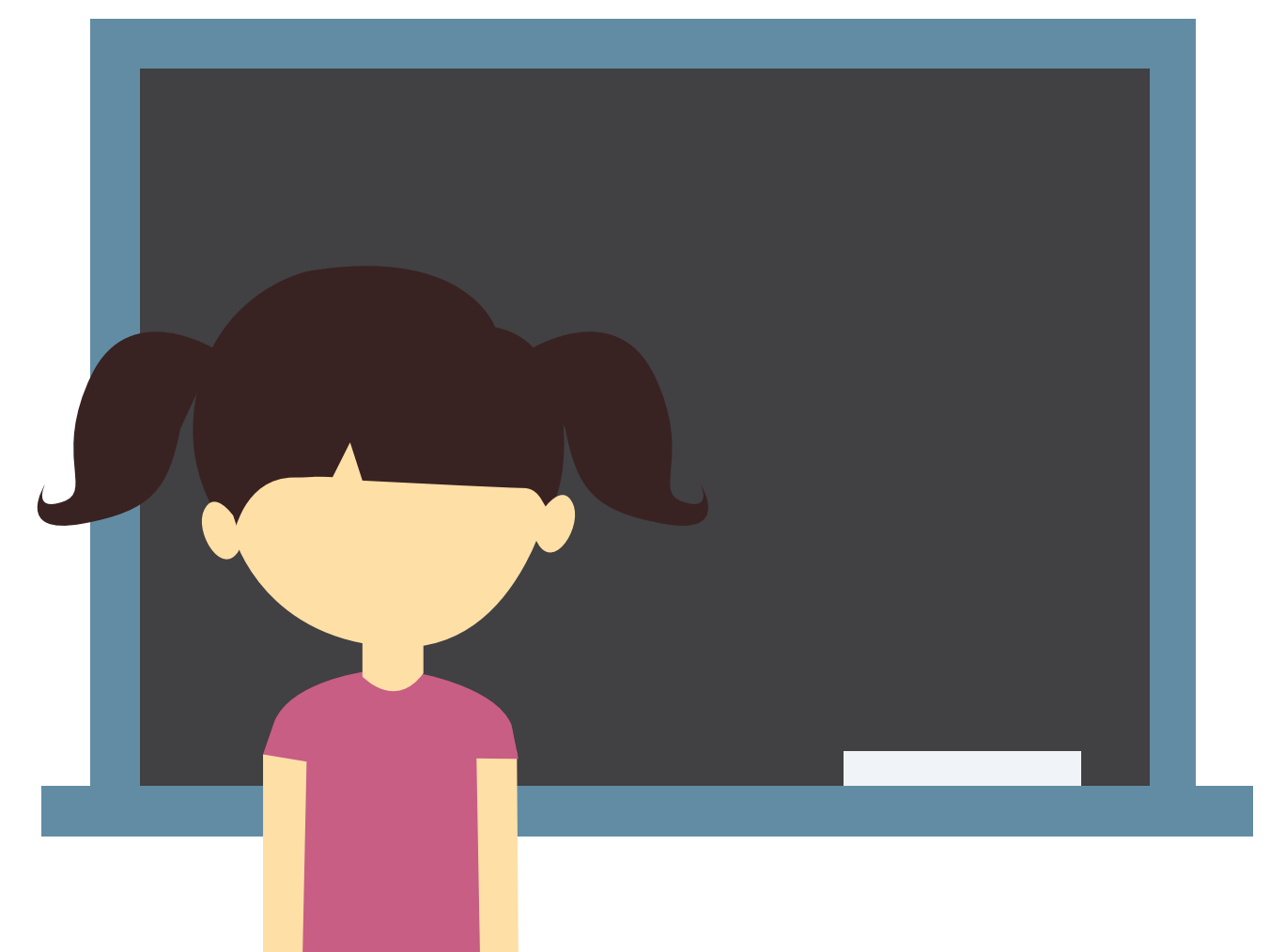
Our neighbors are facing homelessness

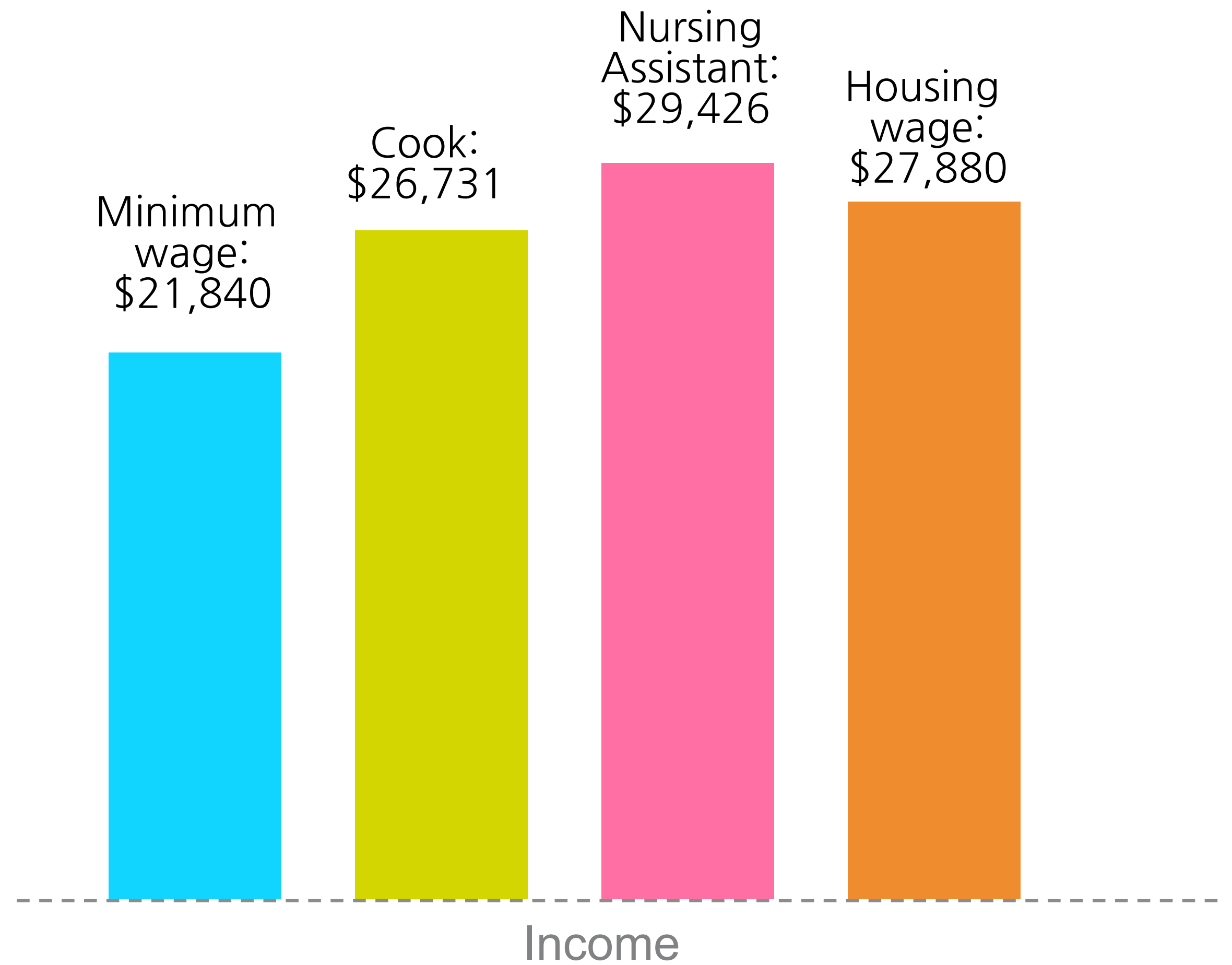


Mean renter wage
