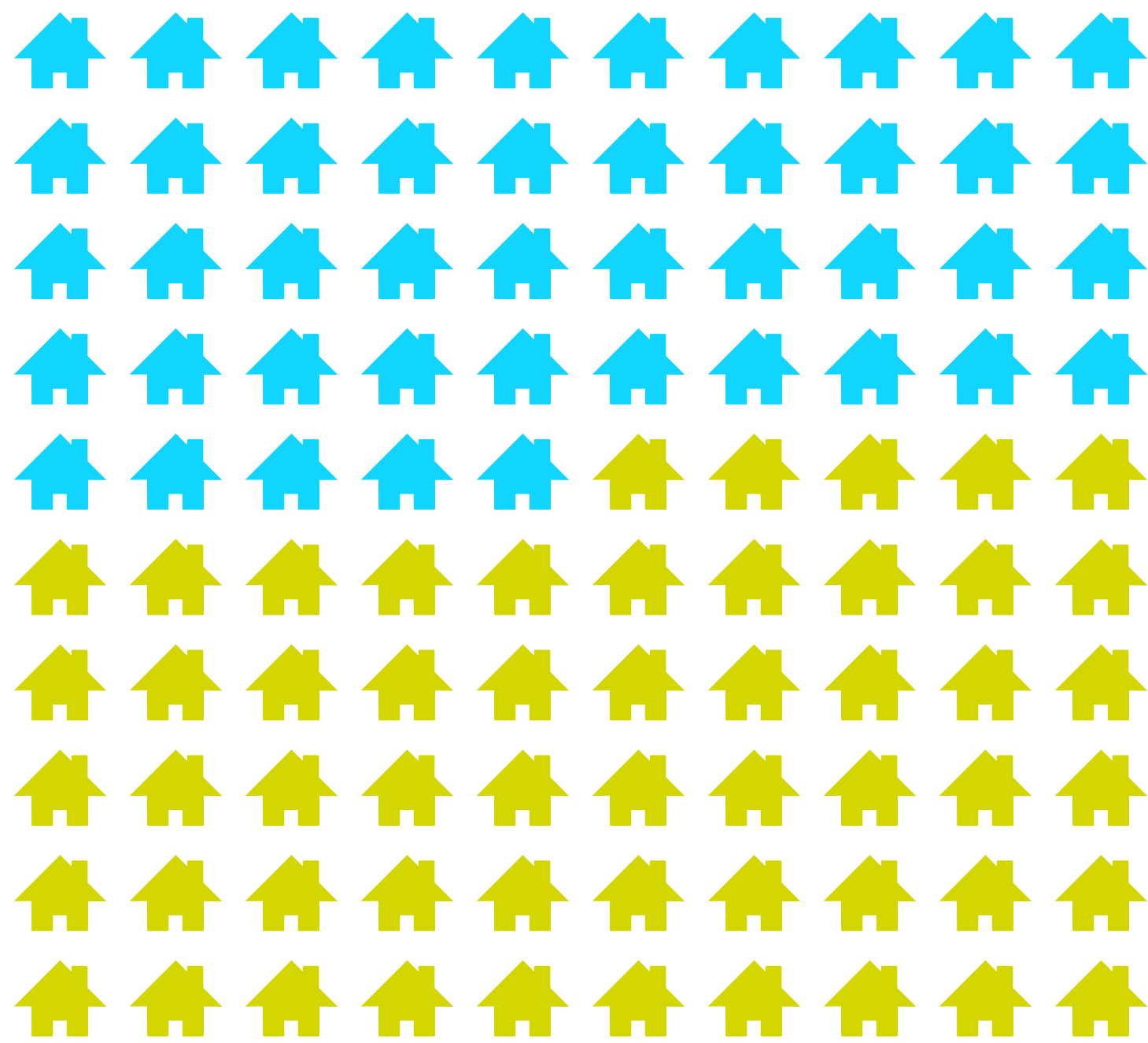


A Place to Call Home: Wallowa County

We have a serious shortage of affordable housing

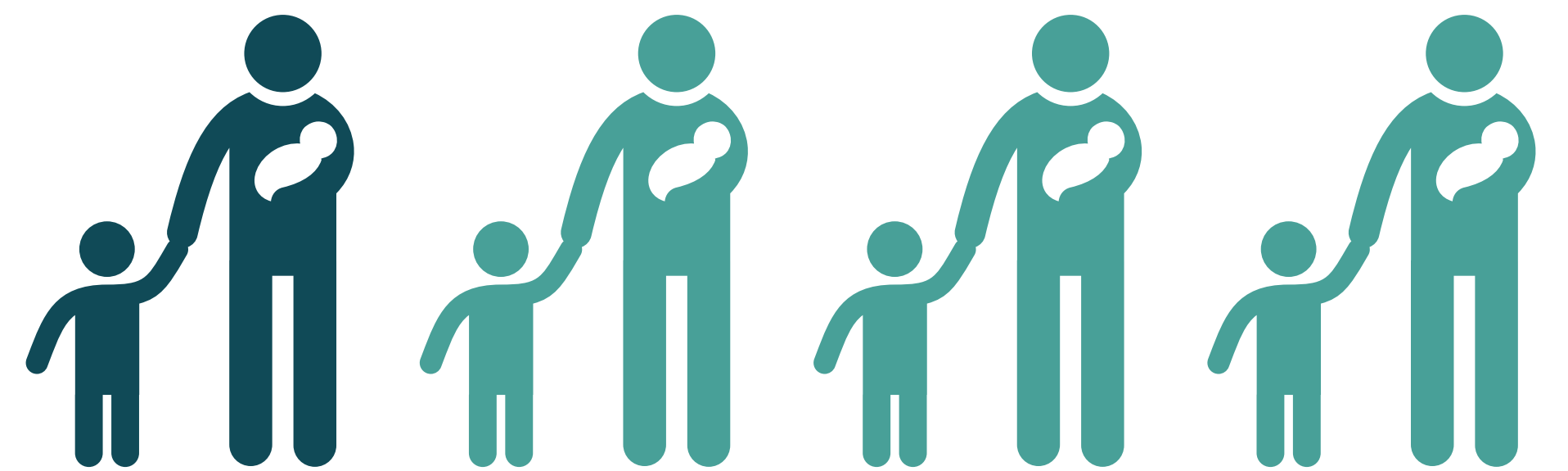
For every 100 families with extremely low incomes, there are 45 affordable units available.

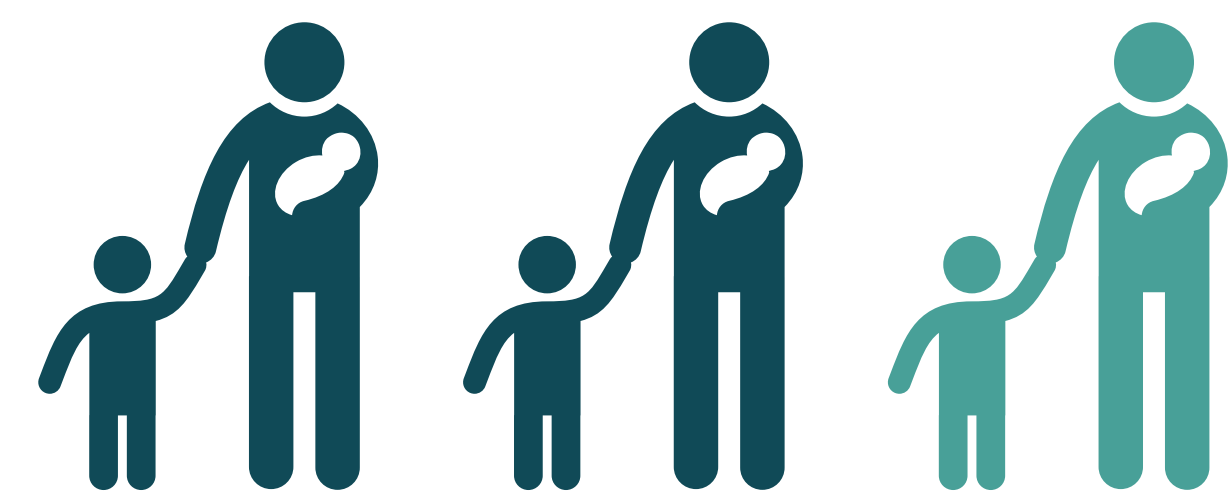

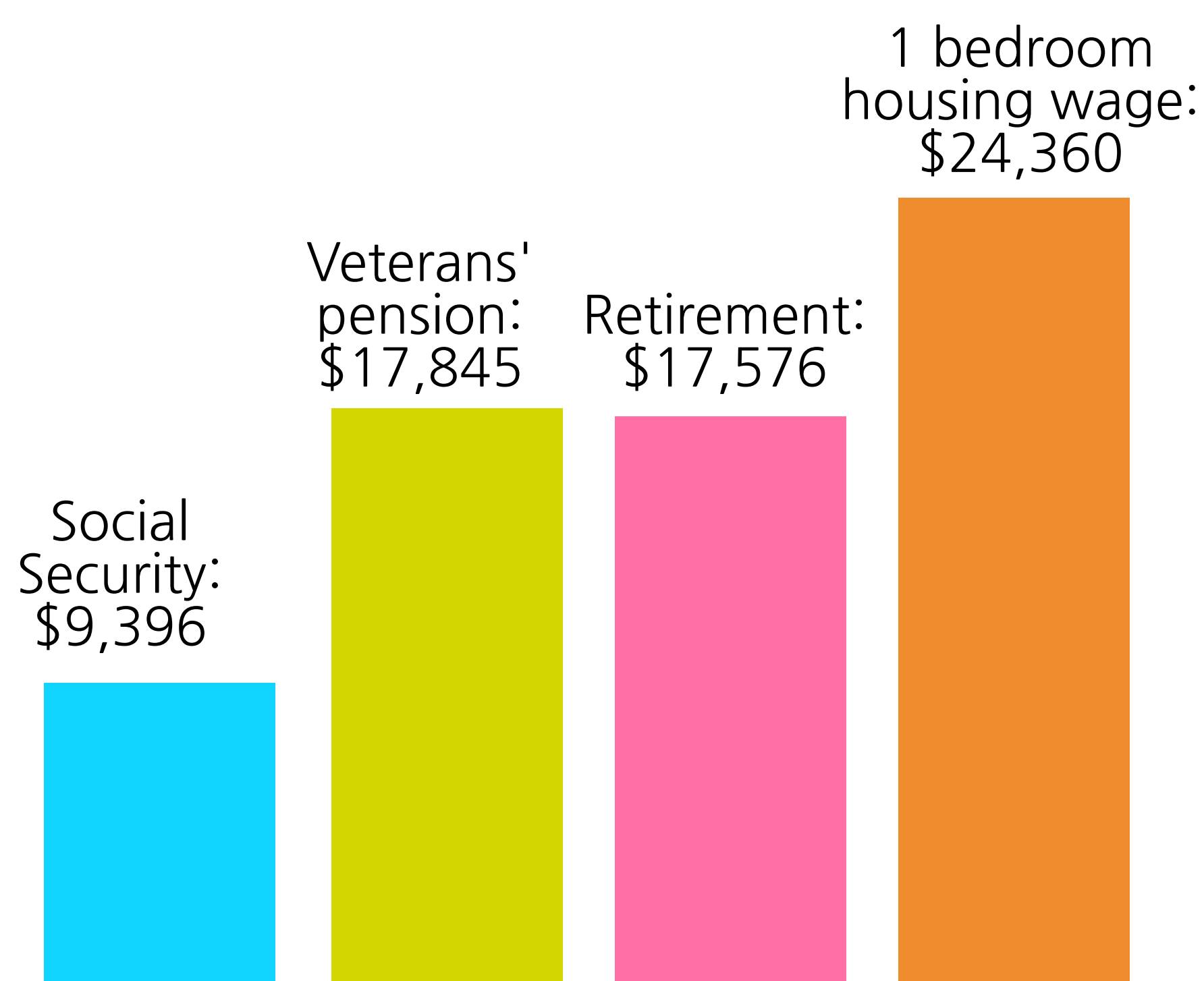
renters are paying more than 50% of their income in rent

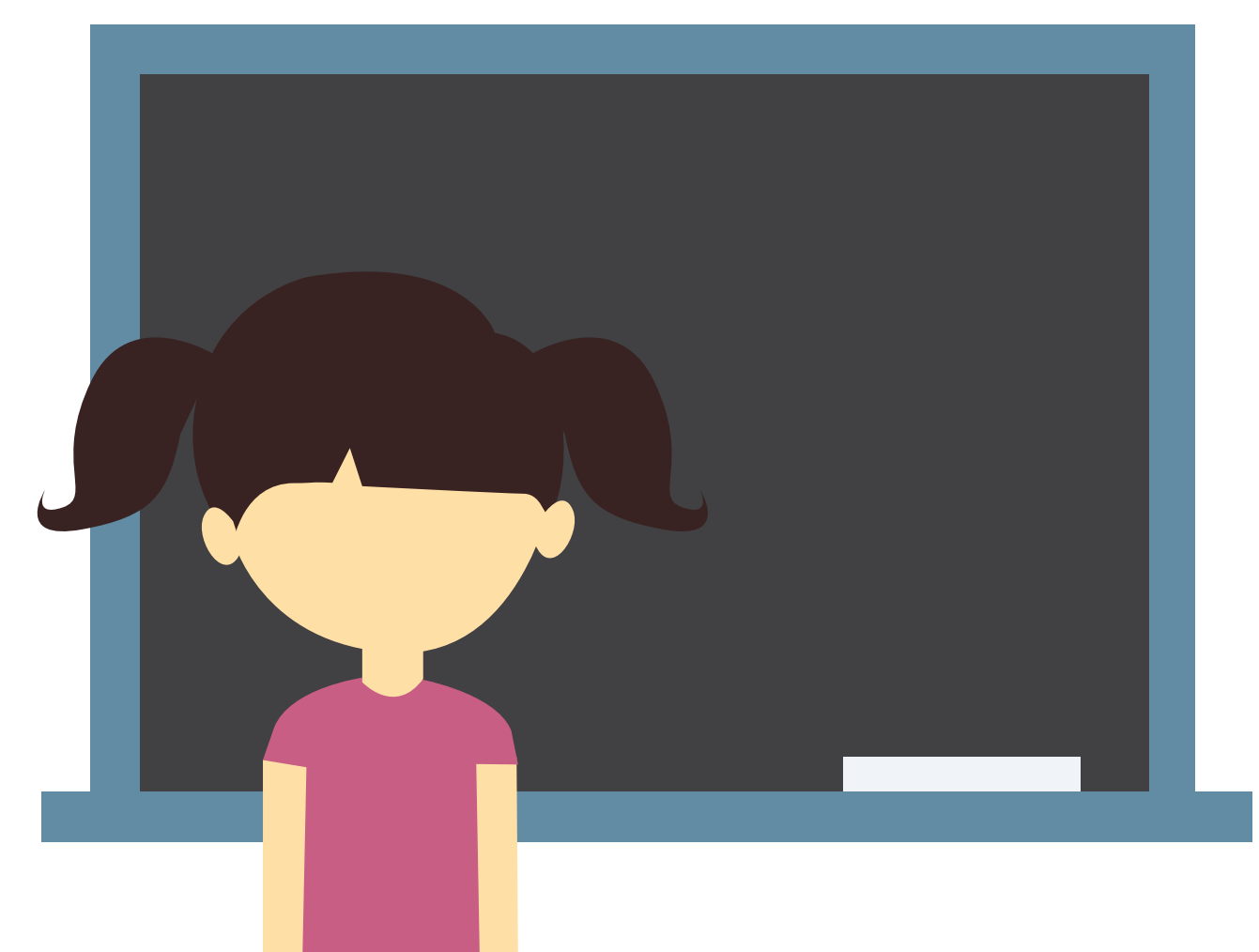
Our neighbors are facing homelessness

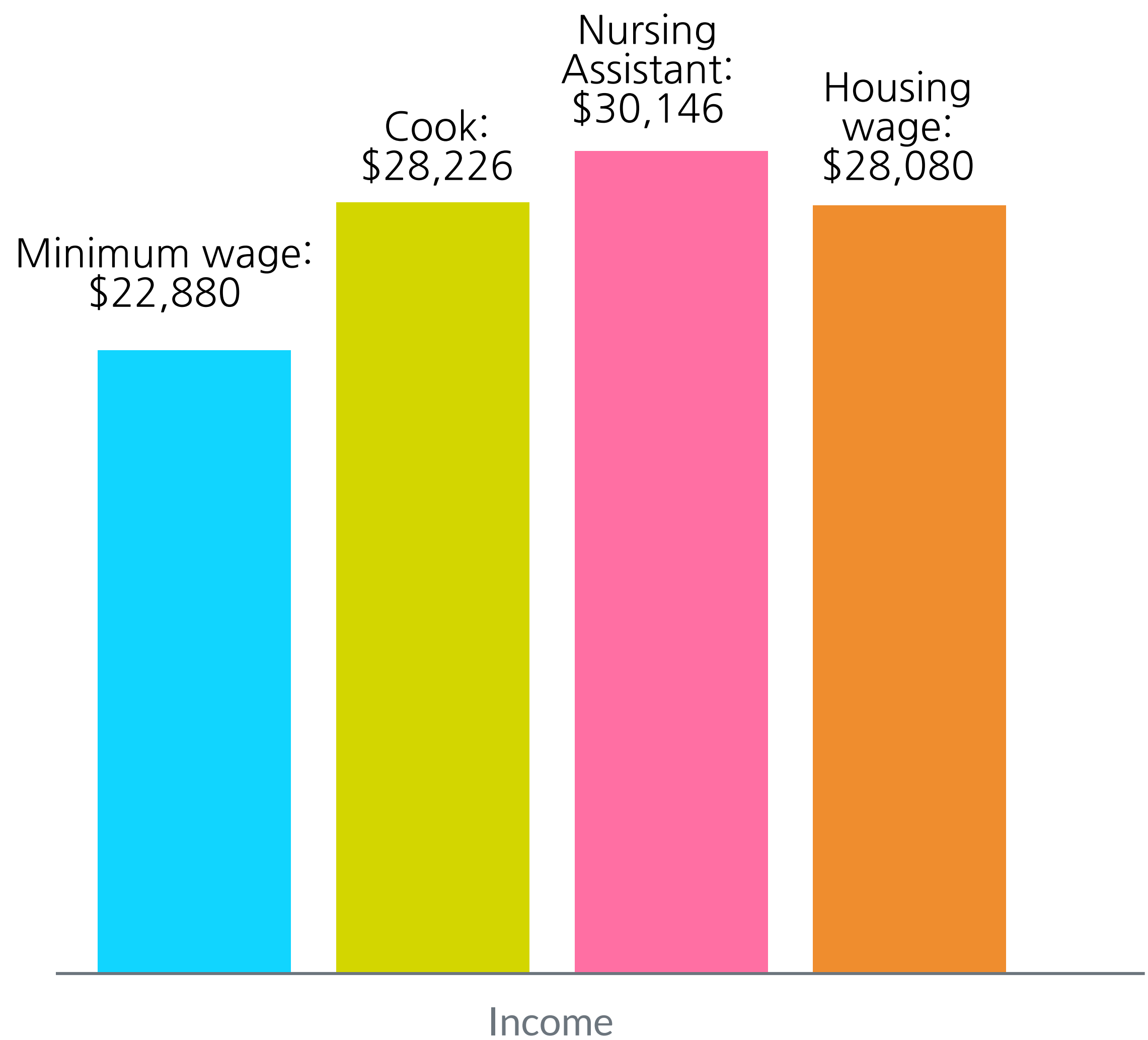


Mean renter wage

A household must earn at least \$28,080 to afford a 2 bedroom apartment at fair market rent.

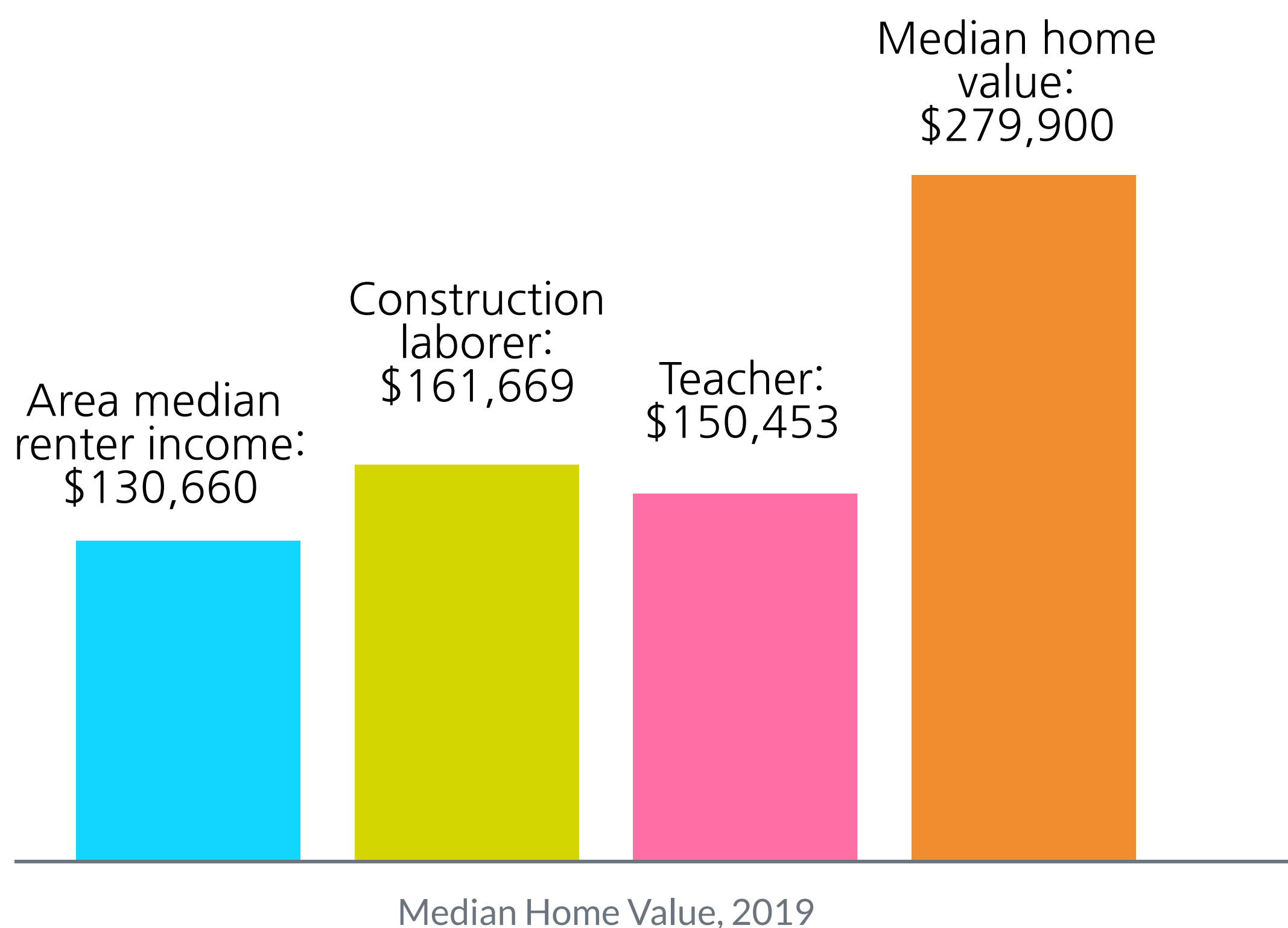


Homeownership is out of reach for many
